Maths Skills

For example, you may use the language of measuring when cooking or carrying out DIY tasks, or develop your child's awareness of counting in 2s when pairing up socks together. There really is a number, shape or pattern link in everything we do, and the children really enjoy learning about these areas. Have fun! ©

Our Learning this Week

This week Year R will continue to revise and apply their phonic knowledge taught so far, along with reading a selection of nonsense words, too. For example, the children should be able to read z-i-b and sh-ai-f through application of their phonic skills. In handwriting we will look at the formation of robot letters, including r, n, m, h, b, p and k. Hopefully Year R enjoyed using their Letter Formation books with you at home. Please return them by Wednesday so we can update them with the new letters. In other English work the children will be retelling the story of St Patrick, and completing their book review of their favourite book so that we can update our class Reading Garden display. In maths we will be introducing the concept of sharing items equally, linking with the skill of division. The children will take part in lots of practical work, and will also find out that sharing by 2 is the same as halving. Year 1 children will be solving number sentences linked to this area, for example, $6 \div 2 = 3$, by using their knowledge of times tables to help with this process. Please continue embedding the times tables of 2, 10 and 5 at home, so that the children can gain greater confidence with this. Our Act of Worship theme this week is learning about bible

stories linked with a stormy and wild sea. The children will learn about how Jesus calmed the storm in our class worship. Feel free to read along at home.
